Migrating children and youth, especially those fleeing armed conflicts in search of peace and stability as well as those fleeing poverty and social inequalities in pursuit of better educational and economic opportunities, are often thought of as the most vulnerable. Activists call for protecting and assisting them. Yet, in today's world where 'deserving' migrants are pitted against 'undeserving' migrants, children and youth on the move also face hostilities and violence, exclusion and othering. The research findings presented in this panel draw on studies with Senegalese and Gambian youth attempting to reach Europe or North Africa in canoes; Ukrainian students in the United Kingdom; primary school Ukrainian pupils in Polish schools; and analysis of evaluation tools used to place foreign-born children in schools in Italy and Spain. The panelists engage with issues of institutional/state violence; coping strategies to circumvent exclusionary policies; conflict-induced student migration; false dichotomy of 'forced' and 'voluntary' migration; education as a bordering practice preventing integration; and capabilities and limitations of standardized test employed in foreignborn student placement. The research presented in this panel involved a wide range of methodologies, including longitudinal interviews; analysis of media and scientific literature discourses; ethnographic interviews with Ukrainian children, their parents, and educators in Poland; and analysis of laws and policies. The findings emphasize the failure of externalization of border protections to circumvent clandestine

#### ABSTRACT

This paper examines the capabilities and limitations of standardized tests to assess school settings that include students with a migrant background. It compares two education systems –Italian and Spanish-- to focus on the certification and evaluation of educational backgrounds of first- and/or second-generation migrant minors.

In Italy, the results of the Invalsi tests of pupils with non-Italian citizenship are compared with those of their native peers. In particular, the differences between 1st and 2nd generation natives and foreigners in the standardized tests of Italian and Mathematics (G8) administered between 2012/13 to 2021/22 school year is analyzed. Examination of the historical series is critical because it allows us to discuss the effects of Covid-19 on school admission of particular students in the context of structural limitations of the Italian school system. by the Evaluation Institute and carried out at the territorial level every three years by the individual Autonomous Communities and a diagnostic evaluation at the territorial level delegated to the individual Autonomous Community and carried out annually. We focused the analysis on the comparison of native pupils with foreign-born pupils. The evaluation of schools should also consider how inclusive the school is, i.e., they can guarantee similar performance results for students with Italian and Spanish citizenship and potential "new citizens."

Supporting international students fleeing humanitarian crises. Untangling the experiences of students from Ukraine

#### ABSTRACT

Our paper reveals the localized experiences, personal stories, contemporary needs and unique vulnerabilities of refugees in UK higher education who have fled the war in Ukraine. Our discursive approach, which seeks to amplify their diverse voices, contrasts with current media narratives fetishizing narrow quantitative and

We challenge the unhelpful if pervasive dichotomy between either 'forced' or 'voluntary'

migration. Whilst international students are typically unquestioningly compartmentalized as the latter, with their movements often sanitized as 'globetrotting' or 'global citizenship', these notions are deeply problematic in the case of students fleeing conflict and indeed can militate against effective decision and policy making in higher education. The paper therefore contributes to the empirically under-researched concept of 'conflict-induced student migration' (van Hear, Brubaker, and Bessa 2009; Kirkegaard & Nat-George 2016). Our data, based on a dozen Ukrainians studying in the UK in 2023, suggest student funding opportunities, student hostility towards refugees, language support and targeted communication as key areas for development so that the higher education journey can be a more welcoming one for students fleeing humanitarian crises. The results therefore serve to relativize some of the proclamations universities, as complementary pathway providers, make about their commitments to inclusivity and equality. Moreover, our findings aim to support evidence-based policy making at institutional and crossinstitutional levels in higher education.

Navigating and negotiating borders in primary education. Ukrainian children in Polish schools

#### ABSTRACT

Nadia, a primary school teacher in a large city in Ukraine, arrived in Poland just a few weeks after the Russian invasion of her homeland. Some of Nadia's students were still in Ukraine, but many were scattered around Europe. Divided by borders but united in their desire to continue their education under their teacher's tutelage, they soon joined their classmates on Zoom and proceeded to learn in cyberspace. The case of Nadia's students was a successful albeit challenging attempt to avoid disruption in the schooling process and uniting across borders. Using ethnographic data from empirical research with Ukrainian migrant students and their teachers in Poznań, Poland, as well as analysis of selected curricula, in this paper we look at education as a bordering practice. Nadia's students and thousands of other migrant pupils entered Polish public schools--the law accords them this right—but do they belong to the "imagined communities" or are they perceived as the Other no matter how long they have been learning in Polish schools? What borders keep them separated from their Polish classmates? Are these borders imagined or real? Are there initiatives aimed at facilitating migrant children's integration into Polish schools? We juxtapose the bordering of knowledge carried out through mandated curriculum emphasizing practices of nationhood with practices of (some) teachers aimed at transcending formal borders and creating different understandings of belonging and learning.
